### Overview



AY 2022-2023 Summary

This was an exciting year for the DU Honors program, as we saw a great deal of growth in student engagement with the program, with their peers, and with Honors courses.

We dramatically expanded our student leadership opportunities, hiring 5 Honors Student Association members and a student worker to assist with recruitment and first-year onboarding. We also recruited 12 student mentor volunteers, and continued working with 2 student representatives to Honors Council. We continued to expand our quarterly list of activities and engagement opportunities and found our students becoming increasingly engaged. And we organized a new required fall Honors Summit for all first year students.

We brought in a number of new courses and course concepts, including an interterm course in Kenya, Honors seminars taught by Honors leadership on subjects surrounding professional development, and some new course models. We also brought in a number of new faculty to the program. We continue to work to improve our support to students as they work towards earning distinction in their majors, and this is a major area of growth for the program moving forward.

We are excited to continue this work in AY 23-24 and are particularly excited about rolling out some curricular reforms to make the Honors student experience more coherent and holistic.

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### Community

#### **Mission Statement:**

### Student Events

We continued to develop our student events this year. For the first time since the pandemic, the Honors Student Association took charge of planning, organizing, and running a number of these events under the mentorship of the Honors Program Manager. They organized cultural, sporting, and other social events, which were all very well-attended. Twenty-four of 67 survey respondents who had attended Honors events mentioned sporting events as being among their favorites; 26 mentioned cultural events; and 9 mentioned off-campus social events.

While "big ticket" events like sports and theatre consistently filled (sometimes within minutes of registration opening), smaller event attendance dropped off significantly in spring. We plan to adjust our spring offerings accordingly next year.

### Student Events

In addition to orientation, advising, and graduation-related events, Honors leadership also organized 1-2 on-campus activities each quarter, including food, board games or lawn games depending on the weather, and opportunities for informal socializing with peers and Honors leadership. All of these took place in the Dimond Family Residential Village 195 Events Space, or in the Honors/PLP/LLC suite. All were well attended, and 38 of 67 survey respondents who had attended Honors events mentioned these events as being among their favorites.

This fall, we tried out a new concept called "Honors Summit." This was designed in response to student feedback in AY 21-22 focus groups that they struggled to meet other students in their cohort and would have liked some bonding activity in their first quarter at DU. The program was required for all Honors students. We organized two day-long events (students selected to do one of the two) that included visioning, trivia games, a peer mentor panel, lunch, an "Amazing Race" activity, and a dessert social. Students were generally excited and positive about the event, though they felt it was too long, and was tough to give up a full day. In response to these concerns, we will be condensing the event next year into a 4-hour evening program, again with an option for students to choose one of two evenings to attend.

### Co-Sponsorships, Scholarships, & Grants

Fall quarter, we co-sponsored Phi Beta Kappa's Visiting Scholar lecture by Professor Ganesh Sitaraman (Vanderbilt University Law School) who spoke on "The Future of Supreme Court Reform" and did a lunch with Honors students the following day.



### **Status of Funding**

As reported last year, we determined that our student grants were redundant with URC grants, and thus did not offer awards formerly known as "Special Honors Funding" this year. We were happy with this decision and plan to continue referring students to the URC for research and conference travel funding moving forward.





### Student Leadership



In addition to the faculty members on Honors Council, the Honors student body elected 2 student representatives in winter 2022 who served for the 2022-23 year. These student representatives attended all Honors Council meetings and provided valuable student perspectives on program and curriculum discussion.



We held an election during spring quarter for Luke Venezia's replacement, as his term was coming to an end.

This past year we had five Honors Student Association leaders who were hired at the end of spring 2022. These leaders met bi-weekly to plan, coordinate, publicize and execute events and programming for the Honors community. This was the first year working with this model for student activities, and it was extremely successful. Overall students seem much more engaged with the program – both through events attendance, mentorship engagement, and social media channels.

#### **Honors Recruitment Assistant Role**

### Online Presence

### Admissions



Summary of 2022-2023
Recruitment Cycle

This year we received a record-breaking 390 completed applications to the Honors Program (in addition to 34 incomplete applications and 17 unsubmitted applications). This suggests a strong demand for the type of programming that we are offering and a positive recruitment presence by the DU Honors Program.

We accepted 179 of these students which yielded a final first-year cohort of 91 students.

We intentionally kept the cohort slightly smaller this year as we are changing our admissions model next year to only allow students to apply after the fall of their first quarter. We will do outreach to FSEM instructors and students in the fall to advertise this change, and thus anticipate adding at least 10 more students in Winter of 2024 to complete our cohort.

This change in admissions structure was based on the concern that many students were joining Honors so late that they had already completed most of their Common Curriculum requirements, rendering the program requirements either almost null or redundant and burdensome. Because students can pursue distinction in their majors without joining Honors, this is generally the better option for advanced students.

### Admissions

This year saw the launch of our revamped admissions application, featuring new short essay questions and a change from recommendation letter to recommendation form. This change created better alignment between application questions and the evaluation rubric, making application review more consistent with the Honors Program mission.

We worked closely with the Office of Admission to recruit new students for the 2023-24 academic year. We collaborated to revamp our email marketing campaign. We also attended numerous recruitment events, including those listed below, to present information and field questions:

### Faculty Engagement

We are trying to identify and target some of the best teachers at DU to teach with the Honors Program. We have added a few new courses for AY 2023-24, and have ongoing conversations in the works with other interested faculty. The goal is to get to a point where we have at least a 2-year rotating schedule of course offerings.

In an effort to build more community with our Honors faculty, we also hosted a faculty happy hour mid-way through spring quarter that was extremely successful – about 15 faculty members showed up for all or part of the event, and made great connections across programs.

We also continued offering new faculty in the program the chance to get lunch with an existing faculty member when they were ready to start working on their syllabus and course design. The following faculty took advantage of this opportunity:

### Curriculum

We are very excited about three innovations in the Honors curriculum that were piloted this year.

First, we introduced two new Honors interterm courses:

- 1. Robert Uttaro and Dhaval Vyas took a group of Honors students to Kenya for an SISC course on "Wildlife Conservation & Culture." All feedback from the course was exceptionally positive, and we are excited to be offering this course again next year.
- 2. Jared Del Rosso offered his popular "Denver Wilds" HSEM course as a spring interterm. Despite the interterm format making a lot more sense for this class, we unfortunately did not see high enough enrollment to run the course.

Our take-away from these experiences is that students are less interested in local interterms, and more interested in travel courses, though it could also be the case that spring interterms are just harder to fill due to the tighter course schedule.

We also piloted a series of courses that we are hoping to roll out in modified versions as required Honors curriculum starting in AY24-25.

- HNRS 2400: Extreme Academics (2 credits), taught by Kate Tennis. This class was designed as the successor to the prior voluntary Extreme Academics program. It built in many of the same learning experiences, designed to help students make the most of their time at DU and get ready for competitive experiences including fellowships, graduate school, or job opportunities. The class was most successful for sophomore students and this is where we are planning to require it in the curriculum moving forward.
- HNRS 2400: Into the Unknown (1 credit), taught by Kira Castle. This class was designed for Honors seniors, giving them a place to reflect on their futures, their values, and the value of their time at DU. Students enjoyed the low-pressure atmosphere and space for honest conversation with peers during this transitional point in their lives.

Helen Hazen also brought in a new course concept, coupling an existing non-Honors SISC course (The Human Population: Sustainability & Social Justice) with an Honors Seminar, in order to enable Honors students enrolled in both to get credit for an Honors SISC and an Honors Seminar simultaneously. While our preference is always for Honors-exclusive Common Curriculum courses, this provided a useful template for courses that we may wish to include in the curriculum but that cannot be offered in this smaller format due to departmental constraints.

## Distinction Challenges

We recognize that many students drop the Honors program when it comes time to earn distinction in their majors because they are unprepared or cannot meet the requirements. This is a major area for future growth for the program, and we gathered data in our quantitative survey (findings summarized in Appendix A) about what types of programming might help students.



#### → Identified Issues

The main challenge students noted when talking about distinction was the lack of clarity about requirements, followed by challenges identifying a project, with procrastination being the least salient concern.

#### ——— Possible Solutions

Of 21 respondents, 13 said they would have been interested in a 1-credit HSEM to help them with writing in fall or winter of Senior year, and 10 said they would have been interested in an optional drop-in workshop, with most interested in Winter quarter. Specific requests for how the Honors program could better support students was mostly focused on the need to communicate more and earlier about expectations, timelines, and requirements. Some asked for information in freshman and sophomore years; others for a ping in the year before they need to start.

This year, we again did a spring panel on "Demystifying Distinction" and included a peer mentorship component. Though only sparsely attended, it seemed to be useful for those who attended.

### Plans for Next Year

We are excited for the next year of the University Honors Program and have a number of priorities for our AY23-24 activities.



### Cohort & Community Building

Next year we hope to continue to grow our program and deepen the Honors community. Although we will need to reduce the size of HSA (due to budget cuts) we will be expanding the role of work-study students. And we have plans for a strong student onboarding program through Orientation and Honors Summit.

### ( ) Curriculum Updates

We are excited to be working towards curricular changes. This will include (1) a new required 2-credit course for Sophomores to get them started on their distinction projects, connected to DU resources, and thinking strategically about their futures, and (2) a new required 1-credit course for Honors seniors designed to help them connect in their last year of school, reflect on their college journeys, and prepare for the next step of their journeys. We will continue to offer Honors Summit as a non-credit-bearing course.

### ( ) SI: Natural Cuts

We unfortunately will have to cut our SINP sequences down to just one, which will surely cause some scheduling challenges. But we hope to continue to recruit new faculty to other areas of the program, and to improve and expand our curricular offerings.

#### **2023 Quantitative Survey Feedback Summary**

#### **Survey Feedback**

Response information

- 125 people started the survey
- 102 finished it
- 1 survey was invalid be the student reported not being in the program
- Leaving 101 valide responses.

Of those who completed the survey, this was the distribution of cohort years, suggesting that students who entered in the past year are generally more engaged with the program than those who entered in earlier years, which makes sense given both COVID and Honors leadership transitions.

#### **Honors floor**

31 out of the 101 respondents lived on the Honors floor.

Of the 5 respondents who lived on the floor in AY2019-20 or AY2020-21, people saw strong points in terms of community, but also noted the challenges of building community and lack of events during covid.

Of the remaining respondents, 10 lived on the floor on AY2021-22, and the remaining 16 in AY2022-23.

- Strong points of the floor included community, friendships, knowing people before classes started, and a shared academic focus
- Weak points ranged from some who felt the "social scene was very dead" to those who felt it was "chaotic and loud." A couple mentioned that it felt like a "bubble" or was hard to meet people off of the floor. One said that it could be cliquey and another that they didn't fit in.
- Tangible suggestions for improvements include
  - Most common response: more floor-specific activities, especially at the beginning of the year
  - move the floor somewhere where there are gender-neutral bathrooms available –
     and there were general concerns about the location of the floor being on the non-entry side of the building
  - o study rooms
  - quiet hours

o pool table or other games

#### **Social Events**

67 of the respondents had attended at least one Honors event over the past year.

We asked those who did not attend events why they hadn't attended

- 5 were not interested
- 3 wanted to attend but events filled
- 6 wanted to attend but events didn't appeal
- 20 "other" most commonly this was scheduling conflicts, with the second most common response being that student's didn't have friends in the program. 1 was on study abroad. 1 reported depression.

Of those who had attended the events, we asked them to list their favorites. I am setting ranking aside because some ranked and some didn't. This is the frequency with which they mentioned different types of events:

- 24 mentions of sporting events
- 26 mentions of cultural events
- 38 mentions of on-campus social events (picnic, cocoa bar, trivia night, etc.)
- 9 mentions of off-campus social events (mini-golf etc.)
- 21 mentioned informational events (pizza and advising, distinction information session, study abroad session, or summer opportunities session)
- 8 mentioned summit

When asked what types of events they'd like to see more of, students responded as follows:

- 16 mentioned sporting events
- 19 mentioned cultural events
- 13 mentioned various on-campus social events
- 3 mentioned off-campus social events
- 4 wanted more informational events
  - o about undergraduate research and going to grad school; career-readiness; conference

Specific ideas that we are not currently doing included:

- On-campus competitions spikeball tournament (x2), kickball game (x2), pool tournament, frisbee, water balloon fight, etc.
- Trip to a natural site like Roosevelt forest
- End of year banquet (including faculty and students from different class years); networking events
- Breakfast / morning events (to ease scheduling conflicts)

Those who lived on the Honors floor were somewhat more likely to have attended at least one event, but not by a wide margin:



# SINP Sequence for 2023-2024 for non-science majors/minors

Next year, the Honors program will offer only one SI: Natural (Common Curriculum science sequence) option for <u>non-majors</u>: Global Environmental Change. This course is co-taught by three stellar faculty members in Geography and has been consistently popular with our students. If for some reason this course does not fit in your schedule, you also have the option of taking one of the Major/Minor science sequences listed on our <u>checklist</u>. We are sorry to lose Prof. Sasaki's Honors Biology course, but we simply were not able to fill two science sequences.
